PASTORAL LETTER



Friends -

One of the comments heard around the church in response to my letter of resignation has been:

"So I guess everything stops now, right?" It's an understandable question. But it involves a misunderstanding of what transitional ministry is about!

What needs to happen, when a church is in between called pastors, is a bit of communal self-reflection. Who are we as a church? What more is God calling us to become? The purpose of this reflection is to clarify who you are as a faith community, and what kind of ministry you are committed to, so that this vision can guide your search for the right next pastor for the church.

Putting the church's ministry on hold "until a new pastor arrives" actually defeats this purpose! Instead transitional pastors are trained to enter into a church's ongoing ministry, help you sustain what's strong, let go of what's holding you back, clarify your sense of mission and vision, and keep moving steadily towards it. While there were unusual circumstances that led to Trinity's last interim extending for 4 years, typically this transitional period between called

pastors lasts 12-18 months.

So please be assured: ministry does not "stop" when a pastor departs! The services and programs currently in place will continue, and new ministries may develop and grow out of them. Elsewhere in this Vision, for example, you will see that the WedNiteAlive! schedule is planned through the spring, including an exciting Lenten series exploring Beatitude living.

The work on development does not stop either. At a recent meeting convened to inform the developers of my upcoming departure, representatives from the Long Range Development Team and the Presbytery were on hand to assure them that the church remains committed to exploring this direction fully. Meanwhile the developers are making progress on a more modest and financially viable design to help bring this dream closer to reality.

You have on your session a solid group of leaders. You have a committed staff. You have a session-appointed Transition Team who will help put in place transitional pastoral leadership. I have every confidence you will be well-led, as you keep growing into your mission to "serve God in the heart of this city", through lively worship, strong discipleship and wide service.

JANUARY SCRIPTURE READINGS

Two special Sundays begin the calendar year, Epiphany and the Baptism of the Lord, with readings appropriate to the revealing of the light of Christ to the world, and the meaning of both Jesus' and our own baptism. After that we begin a set of readings that will take us up to the start of Lent. The Gospel readings, mostly from Matthew, explore the calling of the disciples and other early events of Jesus' ministry, including several sections from the Sermon on the Mount. The Old Testament readings are selected to help us unpack the Gospel for the day. And the New Testament readings take us into what is arguably the most beloved of Paul's letters, I Corinthians.

Read the stories, listen to the texts, gather together around Word and font and table, and let yourselves be met by the living God. Join us for mid-week Bible Study at 5:00 pm each Wednesday. Every Sunday, as one passage is set beside another, new insights emerge from the dialogue between them.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISM

On January 12, the Sunday we read the gospel account of the Baptism of Jesus, worship will include an opportunity to remember and renew our own baptismal vows. The point is not to remember the event of our baptism long ago (most Presbyterians, baptized as infants, can't do that anyway!). Rather it is to remember that we are baptized, and that our baptism makes an important difference to who we are and how we live. On that Sunday in worship, we will celebrate the gracious gift of our baptismal identity as God's own, and recommit ourselves to living out our baptismal calling as followers of Jesus.

HAPPY NEW YEAR! The church was busy with service and giving during the year-end holiday season.

- The Christmas Joy Offering was \$2,600, serving retired pastors and missionaries, and students in PCUSA racial-ethnic schools and colleges.
- Christmas Market received about \$1,300, most of it for DouglaPrieta Works in animals and gardening supplies.
- 600 pairs of socks were stuffed with toiletries and distributed via the Casa Maria Soup Kitchen.
- Angel Tree provided Christmas gifts for at least 50 children of prisoners.
- We assembled dozens of diaper bundles for families in Kayenta, AZ.
- We provided enough food for over 110 men at the Primavera shelter on New Year's Eve.
- We held a successful food collection at Winterhaven for the Tucson Community Food Bank.
- A sizeable number of homeless people have been fed and supplied since Christmas Day.

STEWARDSHIP SUMMARY

We are very close to our 2014 Pledge goal of \$280,000 - about 10 or 15K higher than last year's giving.

Our <u>projected</u> budget "shortfall" for 2013 was close to \$150,000. When the final checks are in, we will have <u>posted</u> about \$100,000 as a "shortfall" - \$50,000 better than projected. Our \$150,000 bridge grant from the Emerald Foundation for 2013 more than covers this "shortfall".

PROJECT HOSPITALITY:

We're serving dinner for 200! As most of you have heard, the Salvation Army's Project Hospitality program for homeless men and women has been handled in-house this year. We have agreed to serve dinner for one evening for the group, which may include folks coming in for Project Deep Freeze should temperatures dip low. We will need 8 volunteers to come with us to serve dinner, and will need the help of the entire congregation to cook the meal. On Sunday, January 12, we will hand out aluminum trays asking for a dish to be prepared and returned potluck-style on January 19th. The trays will be labeled with the type of dish needed to fill out the

meal. If your dish can be frozen, it can also be brought in advance. We look forward to your help in this awesome event!

FOOD BANK COLLECTION AT WINTERHAVEN

Trinity members volunteered for the Community Food Bank with their annual food drive at the Winterhaven Festival of Lights. This is one of the Food Bank's largest collections, and this year was no exception. Our hard-working volunteers were serenaded by Renaissance Christmas carolers during the shift, and collected both food and monetary donations, meeting generous folks as they entered the Winterhaven neighborhood.

An amazing feat for a church our size, Trinity members purchased one fun gift and one clothing gift each for 30 children, and in addition provided one gift for 20 additional children through a ministry dedicated to ensuring all Pima County children of prisoners were served. In addition to the 80 children's gifts, small caregiver gifts went out as well. Wayne Steele, who delivered packages, reported ".....When I had delivered gifts to the mother and children of an inmate, their gratitude

was so overwhelming- I had ended up crying with them huge tears of joy and gratefulness which had been given to a family that had been estranged".

Policy Training

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY TRAINING IS COMING

It has been more than 20 years since Trinity required training in our Sexual Misconduct Policy. Recently, that policy has been significantly revised and, once again, training regarding the many elements of this policy will be mandatory for many in the church, including staff, Elders and Deacons, volunteers who work with children, and others.

The training will be conducted by two lawyers, our own Terry Dalke, and John Lacy from St.Andrew's Presbyterian Church. It will be on Saturday, January 18th, 2014, from 9:00 a.m. to noon. It will be videotaped so that those who are unable to attend the January 18th session, may fulfill the training requirement at a later date after viewing the video. Other members of the congregation are welcome to attend the training as well.

This is a strong, thoughtful policy, that will help us protect our children and other vulnerable people among and around us. In today's world, this is an educational opportunity that every church member would benefit from.
