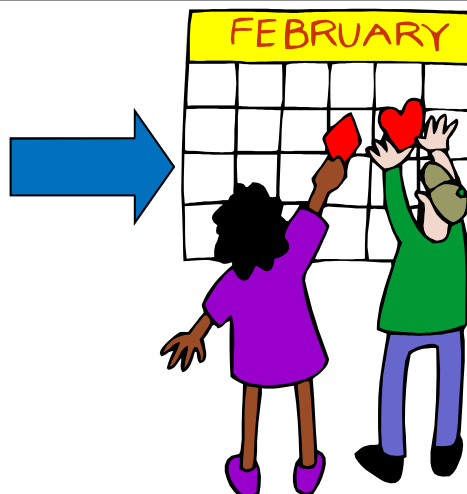

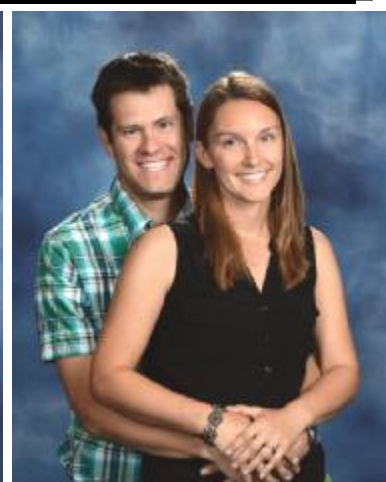
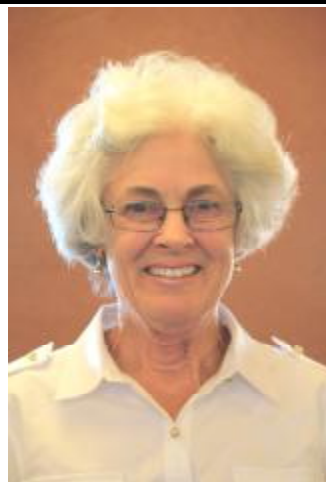
Absence of Mind by Marilynne Robinson

In this ambitious book, acclaimed writer Marilynne Robinson applies her astute intellect to some of the most vexing topics in the history of human thought—science, religion and consciousness. Crafted with the same care and insight as her award-winning novels, *Absence of Mind* challenges postmodern atheists who crusade against religion under the banner of science. By defending the importance of individual reflection, Robinson celebrates the power and variety of human consciousness in the tradition of William James. She explores the nature of subjectivity and considers the culture in which Sigmund Freud was situated and its influence on his model of self and civilization. SESSION NOTES

Session Notes for December 2014

Session members and deacons enjoyed their traditional joint Christmas dinner to socialize and learn about each other's activities during 2014. Lynn Moser led everyone in singing a few carols and we recognized the service of a few leaders who are "retiring" – Heather Lind, Mary Zellar, Liz Strong, Carroll Keegstra and Cameron Toering. After a delightful dinner cooked by the elders, the deacons cleaned up while session continued to meet upstairs in the Upper Room. The deacons held their meeting in the Lovejoy Library.

Most of the business accomplished by session was end of the year housekeeping. Details about the salaries for Jerry Foust and Bill Voigt were approved to satisfy Internal Revenue Service requirements. Details concerning the Session Retreat on January 9-10, 2015 were ironed out.

Session approved Mission Committee's request for up to \$3,000 from the Special Mission Fund to purchase mattresses from Tucson Furniture for the Borderlinks dormitory. Bucky Lovejoy was instrumental in finding a good source and good price for these mattresses. Bucky also reported for the Long Range Dev. Team that there are two tenants interested in development on our Mission Center site.

Property Committee reported that they are waiting on bids to repair the HVAC the Sanctuary and the new doors for the east entrance are under construction. Worship Committee reminded everyone about the upcoming wonderful Christmas music.

Stewardship & Finance presented a projected conservative 2015 budget that Session approved. Administration & Personnel expressed their excitement about the proposed Youth Director position description that Matt Kreamer has been writing.

Christian Education asked Session to approve – with gratitude – Matt Kreamer as Sunday School teacher for the older children (ages 11 to 14) and the curriculum that he proposes. Session wholeheartedly approved this action. Matt will begin his teaching in January.

Billie Holbrook reminded session members that

church leaders and those working with children at Trinity need to sign a Covenant of Sexual Responsibility in the office after viewing the video presentation of Trinity's Sexual Misconduct Policy found on our website. People who work with children also need to be fingerprinted.

Growth & Outreach is excited to offer the congregation www.trinitytucson.org decals for their cars! This team is planning to meet with Presbyterian Campus Ministry to expand outreach to U of A students and invites anyone in the congregation to accompany them on January 13, 2015. Harriet Marsh will lead four classes for the Engage series beginning January 18, 2015 after worship. Watch for upcoming Tours of Trinity to find out which closets are hiding the skeletons.

Session members prayed for many in the congregation, our hard-working leaders and for Trinity PC's future service in our community.

Bit of trivia: Over the years, Steve Barlow has probably made \$8,000 selling burgers and hot dogs during the 4th Avenue Street Fair while Jane Parker initiated serving 500,000 cups of water or so!

TRINITY FOOD PANTRY



Thanks to all my volunteers and those who donated food and other items for our pantry this year. You made a difference in the lives of our clients. Many times the clients have thanked the volun-

teers for providing extra items to add to their bags. Volunteers have been going to the Food Bank's Agency Market and now we can put together bags of food to give to those clients who do not qualify for a food box. The Agency Market gets the extra food items from stores and then offers it to the different distribution sites. Many of the food items that we pick up are perishable items like yogurt and frozen food products. You are invited to go with us to the Agency Market to learn more about the programs being offered by the Food Bank of Southern Arizona. Volunteers are still needed. CHRISTMAS MISSION PROJECTS

December was a busy month for Mission projects. One of the highlights of our very successful Christmas Cantina was watching the children trying to break the piñata. It took an adult to break the piñata. Each young child picked the things they wanted with the help of a parent. The older children knew what to do and scrambled all over the courtyard filling their bags. People were treated to a delicious Mexican lunch and participated in several festive activities.

The "Christmas Market" raised \$1,805 to be split between the village of Malam-Petel in the Cameroons, Frontera de Cristo in Douglas and the Home of Hope and Peace in Nogales. School supplies were also brought to the "Market". Clothing was brought in for the Pascua Yaqui Head Start Program. We collected over 20 jackets, 10 sweat suits, 15 pairs of shoes or flip-flops and many other clothing items. These items will be used by the children and their families enrolled in the program. Clothing is an ongoing need for this organization. We filled five 30 gallon bags with clothes plus the shoes. Thank you for your generosity and support of Trinity's Mission programs.
