PASTORAL LETTER & WORSHIP



Give me a sign!

This is a true story—funny—but no joke.

It was at the end of my Junior Year at the University of California at Riverside. It was early morning in the deep darkness just before dawn, with dense fog cover-

ing the hills behind campus, and a bit chilly. I was walking alone, hands in pockets, and muttering—praying actually, sort of—one of my usual one-sided conversations, whining and complaining to, or *at*, God—and way too busy talking to listen.

"OK, I've had it! I am tired of whatever it is that I am doing—all this drama of devotion and backsliding. Following Jesus is going nowhere. Where are YOU? I am weary to the bone of being alone my attempt to be Christian. I am going through motions. So, if you really give a rip, let me know! Show yourself! I know that you refused to give a sign to the Pharisees when they asked for one. But I am asking! Give me a sign! Show me you are present and involved. Give me a sign!!"

During this "conversation," in fog both real and mental, I shuffled slowly in the direction of a light up ahead. Placing each foot cautiously in front of the other, I began to hum under my breath and mentally recite the words, "When we walk with the Lord, in the light of his word, what a glory he sheds on our way. We will do his good will. He abides with us still, and with all who will trust and obey." Now the chorus, "Trust and Obey, for there's no other way . . . " Bump. At the "no other way" moment, and just as I audibly demanded that God "Give me a sign!", my foot hit something. I raised my head to find my nose inches from a metal pole. I stepped back and looked up to see the full length of a lamp post, and under the light was—get this—a SIGN. It read "ONE WAY." "Trust and obey . . . Oh, I get it!" I laughed. The day dawned as I strolled across the campus to the Student Union, arriving just as the doors opened.

I went in and sat down, alone, at a table. A few moments later a student that I did not know entered the

I have been more keenly aware of God's presence since that day, more that 40 years ago. So, here's what I think. Be watchful. Keep your eyes peeled and your ears open. Trust and obey, and you just may get a sign now and then. In any case, remember what Jesus promised . . .

SESSION NOTES

Session Notes for September 2014

First, the elders were thrilled to have Billie Holbrook at her first stated Session meeting in a long, long time. Second, Lynn Moser opened the meeting with a prayer/hymn called "Gracious Spirit, Heed Our Pleading" that the congregation will soon learn. Third, we finally found the spot in the agenda so that Deacon Moderator, Daphne Madson, can give the Deacon report in person and still have time to drive to a rehearsal across town without being too late. Good things to begin the meeting!

During our Leading Together time, Pastor Jerry Foust showed a power-point presentation titled "The Life Cycle of a Congregation" from The Alban Institute. The information presented gives the elders things to think about as we work toward the future of Trinity PC in order to call a permanent pastor. One main take away idea is that a living church is consciously evolving.

Session did not have many actions for decisionmaking. The elders approved changing the date for Terry's special mission trip destinations. The Tuc-Communion in November from the first Sunday in Advent to the previous Sunday that is Christ the King Sunday. Elders approved the Nominating Committee's recommendation to select a youth elder candidate for a one-year term. Elders approved the appointment of Sherry Letson as "limited power of attorney" to act on behalf of Trinity PC for the estate of Carl Landel. Carl had appointed Sherry as co-executor of his estate with the beneficiaries of his assets to be Trinity PC and Eaton College.

All the committees are on track with their programs. Check your pew for a flyer from the Growth & Outreach Team that affirms children's attendance in worship. Mark your calendar for the deacon-sponsored All Church Picnic planned for November 8th. After the meeting, the Long Range Development Team shared a DVD showing the new marketing material from the Development Group. Administration & Personnel approved some leave time for Bill Voigt and for Lynn Moser. Worship Committee is planning the Christmas Cantata called "Candles and Carols" for December 21st. Christian Education is looking for new teachers, new classes for middle-school students and perhaps a place for interaction with CESL students so they can practice their English. (This would need approval from the U of A).

Mission Committee announced that benevolences given in memory of Terry Dalke are to be placed in the Special Mission Fund for a children's project at HEPAC (Hogar de Esperanza y Paz or Home of Hope and Peace) in Nogales. HEPAC is one of son Homeless Connect held at Trinity was successful with 56 providers and over 375 people served.

Besides the opening prayer/song, session members prayed for many in the congregation. Jerry prayed the closing prayer giving thanks for God's grace and the joy of following His leading.
