PASTORAL LETTER

Are We There Yet?

Somewhere, usually around the half-way point of our summer car trips, either Sean or Amy would ask the magic question. "Are we there yet?" My response was, "Here, take the map and tell me where we are. You be the navigators."

We are on a transitional journey. Our destination is to call a new pastor. I am giving YOU the map now so you can see where we are. There are several key intersections on this trip. Right now the session has a firm grip on the wheel, and pretty soon YOU, the congregation, will be in the driver's seat. (I've got dibs on shotgun! J.) Here is the map, so you can see where we are, and what happens next. Steps that have been accomplished are 'checked off'.

- $\sqrt{1}$. Minister announces intention to leave
- $\sqrt{2}$. Commission on Ministry (COM) appoints a liaison to session.
- √3. COM liaison or Presbytery representative meets with Session. An Interim Search Committee is appointed.
- $\sqrt{4}$. COM exit interview with exiting pastor.
- $\sqrt{5}$. Congregation meets on pastor's last day in the pulpit to concur with dissolution of pastoral relationship.
- $\sqrt{6}$. COM conducts exit interview with Session.
- $\sqrt{7}$. Session hires Interim/Transitional Pastor with approval of COM.
- $\sqrt{8}$. Interim/Transitional Pastor trains/engages Session.
 - **9.** Session engages the congregation in a "Mission Study."
 - **10.** Session presents the congregation's "Mission Study" to the COM for approval, and the COM grants the congregation permission to elect a Pastoral Search Committee (PNC).

- **11.** The congregation elects a PNC.
- **12.** The COM convenes the PNC for orientation and training.
- **13.** The PNC writes a resume for the church, a "Ministry Information Form (MIF)."
- **14.** COM approves the MIF, and grants the PNC permission to send in out and to begin considering pastoral candidates.
- **15.** The PNC selects a candidate, who preaches for the congregation prior to election by the congregation.
- **16.** Newly called pastor begins work.
- **17.** Newly called pastor is installed by the Presbytery.

The PNC is dissolved and thanked.

In step 8 a lot has happened, so that the congregation can engage in a successful Mission Study. Step 9 is foundational for everything that follows. The effective work of the Pastor Nominating Committee hinges on the quality of the congregational mission study. Our mission study process will be contained in a congregation-wide event called "Memories, Hopes and Conversations", on Sunday, February 15. On page 7 of this Vision you can read a description of this event.

The session has been working hard, training and planning to prepare the congregation for new leadership and a new future. They have carefully considered how they might fully engage the congregation as a whole in that vital task. The session has chosen a proven strategy known as Appreciative Inquiry. They have tried it themselves, (with much enthusiasm and enlightenment), and they have appointed a competent team to lead the congregation through step 9.

We are excited and confident that the results of our congregational discernment on February 15 will provide a solid foundation for an effective pastoral search. For the sake of the future of our church, we encourage all of you to participate in "Memories, Hopes and Conversations" on February 15.

LONG RANGE DEV. TEAM UPDATE

The Long Range Development Team is alive and well. It has been some time since my last report in the Vision, because the LRDT has been waiting for the Developers to procure a tenant(s) for the new building. With today's economic conditions, no one is going to build a building on "spec" and then hope to fill it with tenants.

The Developers are working hard to find companies that will move into the building. They are talking with Real Estate Brokers, people from the U of A, Fletcher McCusker from Rio Nuevo, Michael Keith from Downtown Tucson Partnership and Steve Rosenberg from Biz Tucson to get the project out in the public.

They are also talking with representatives from CESL on possible leasing options. This would be wonderful as CESL is currently leasing space in the Ed Wing.

During this search the Developers continue to meet with representatives from WUNA and the City, so that when a tenant is found they can begin the process to construct the building.

The LRDT continues to meet and review any updates the Developers bring to us. Our next meeting is scheduled for January 2015.




FELIZ NAVIDAD!

Session Notes for November 2014

The Trinity PC Session had a most productive stated meeting in November. The following are the highlights of actions and communications undertaken by Session:

- Learned about the emotional side of a congregation or a family from a power-point presentation by Jerry Foust. The source of this information is "The Eight Concepts of Bowen Theory" by Roberta Gilbert, MD.
- Removed 26 persons from Trinity's Inactive Roll. This leaves 25 persons on the Inactive Roll.
- Approved the appointment of Sheila Sievert to the counting team after the resignation of Jan Bond.
- Approved the dates for Communion in 2015.
- Approved <u>not</u> having an 8:00 AM service on December 21st because of the Cantata and December 28th because of the holiday week.
- Signed up for the annual potluck Christmas dinner with the Deacons on December 15, 2014 a Monday evening. Our Deacons "rock" and the elders love to hear about their activities during the past year.
- Authorized the expenditure up to \$4,000 from Capital Maintenance Fund for new entrance doors east of the Narthex. Have you noticed that the current ones are falling apart?
- Approved contracting with the Food Bank of Southern Arizona to be a distribution site to give out The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) food bags during 2015. Volunteer needed in 2015!
- Approved Anne McConnell trading with Billie Holbrook to restore Billie as the chair of Christian Education committee. Thank you to Anne for being a wonderful chair for the past 11 months.
- Received a preview from Jerry about the upcoming December 6th Elder/Deacon Training from 9 to Noon.
- Learned that the records review on November 15th at Church of the Master in Mesa proved Trinity's records are in good and decent order.
- Praised the Nominating Committee for the completion of their work. Four congregants Liz Barlow, Bill Goodhue, Elliott Koeppen and Jean-

nette Ryan – have agreed to serve on the 2015 Nominating Committee. These persons will be elected at the January Annual Congregational Meeting.

- Approved having a Congregational Discernment Event on Sunday, February 15, 2015 as a part of worship with a revised schedule of classes, fellowship time and lunch. The committee planning this event will be promoting the event and informing the congregation. Watch for details!
- Received reports from each committee that illustrate hard work and dedication.

Prayed for those in need of pastoral care and for discernment about God's leading. Session also prayed expressing gratitude for God's gifts for Trinity.

PASTORAL LETTER

Are We There Yet?

Somewhere, usually around the half-way point of our summer car trips, either Sean or Amy would ask the magic question. "Are we there yet?" My response was, "Here, take the map and tell me where we are. You be the navigators."

We are on a transitional journey. Our destination is to call a new pastor. I am giving YOU the map now so you can see where we are. There are several key intersections on this trip. Right now the session has a firm grip on the wheel, and pretty soon YOU, the congregation, will be in the driver's seat. (I've got dibs on shotgun! J.) Here is the map, so you can see where we are, and what happens next. Steps that have been accomplished are 'checked off'.

- $\sqrt{1}$. Minister announces intention to leave
- $\sqrt{2}$. Commission on Ministry (COM) appoints a liaison to session.
- √3. COM liaison or Presbytery representative meets with Session. An Interim Search Committee is appointed.
- $\sqrt{4}$. COM exit interview with exiting pastor.
- $\sqrt{5}$. Congregation meets on pastor's last day in the pulpit to concur with dissolution of pastoral relationship.
- $\sqrt{6}$. COM conducts exit interview with Session.
- $\sqrt{7}$. Session hires Interim/Transitional Pastor with approval of COM.
- $\sqrt{8}$. Interim/Transitional Pastor trains/engages Session.
 - **9.** Session engages the congregation in a "Mission Study."
 - **10.** Session presents the congregation's "Mission Study" to the COM for approval, and the COM grants the congregation permission to elect a Pastoral Search Committee (PNC).

- **11.** The congregation elects a PNC.
- **12.** The COM convenes the PNC for orientation and training.
- **13.** The PNC writes a resume for the church, a "Ministry Information Form (MIF)."
- **14.** COM approves the MIF, and grants the PNC permission to send in out and to begin considering pastoral candidates.
- **15.** The PNC selects a candidate, who preaches for the congregation prior to election by the congregation.
- **16.** Newly called pastor begins work.
- **17.** Newly called pastor is installed by the Presbytery.

The PNC is dissolved and thanked.

In step 8 a lot has happened, so that the congregation can engage in a successful Mission Study. Step 9 is foundational for everything that follows. The effective work of the Pastor Nominating Committee hinges on the quality of the congregational mission study. Our mission study process will be contained in a congregation-wide event called "Memories, Hopes and Conversations", on Sunday, February 15. On page 7 of this Vision you can read a description of this event.

The session has been working hard, training and planning to prepare the congregation for new leadership and a new future. They have carefully considered how they might fully engage the congregation as a whole in that vital task. The session has chosen a proven strategy known as Appreciative Inquiry. They have tried it themselves, (with much enthusiasm and enlightenment), and they have appointed a competent team to lead the congregation through step 9.

We are excited and confident that the results of our congregational discernment on February 15 will provide a solid foundation for an effective pastoral search. For the sake of the future of our church, we encourage all of you to participate in "Memories, Hopes and Conversations" on February 15.

With today's economic conditions, no one is going to build a building on "spec" and then hope to fill it with tenants.

The Developers are working hard to find companies that will move into the building. They are talking with Real Estate Brokers, people from the U of A, Fletcher McCusker from Rio Nuevo, Michael Keith from Downtown Tucson Partnership and Steve Rosenberg from Biz Tucson to get the project out in the public.

They are also talking with representatives from CESL on possible leasing options. This would be wonderful as CESL is currently leasing space in the Ed Wing.

During this search the Developers continue to meet with representatives from WUNA and the City, so that when a tenant is found they can begin the process to construct the building.

The LRDT continues to meet and review any updates the Developers bring to us. Our next meeting is scheduled for January 2015.




FELIZ NAVIDAD!

PASTORAL LETTER

Are We There Yet?

Somewhere, usually around the half-way point of our summer car trips, either Sean or Amy would ask the magic question. "Are we there yet?" My response was, "Here, take the map and tell me where we are. You be the navigators."

We are on a transitional journey. Our destination is to call a new pastor. I am giving YOU the map now so you can see where we are. There are several key intersections on this trip. Right now the session has a firm grip on the wheel, and pretty soon YOU, the congregation, will be in the driver's seat. (I've got dibs on shotgun! J.) Here is the map, so you can see where we are, and what happens next. Steps that have been accomplished are 'checked off'.

- $\sqrt{1}$. Minister announces intention to leave
- $\sqrt{2}$. Commission on Ministry (COM) appoints a liaison to session.
- √3. COM liaison or Presbytery representative meets with Session. An Interim Search Committee is appointed.
- $\sqrt{4}$. COM exit interview with exiting pastor.
- $\sqrt{5}$. Congregation meets on pastor's last day in the pulpit to concur with dissolution of pastoral relationship.
- $\sqrt{6}$. COM conducts exit interview with Session.
- $\sqrt{7}$. Session hires Interim/Transitional Pastor with approval of COM.
- $\sqrt{8}$. Interim/Transitional Pastor trains/engages Session.
 - **9.** Session engages the congregation in a "Mission Study."
 - **10.** Session presents the congregation's "Mission Study" to the COM for approval, and the COM grants the congregation permission to elect a Pastoral Search Committee (PNC).

- **11.** The congregation elects a PNC.
- **12.** The COM convenes the PNC for orientation and training.
- **13.** The PNC writes a resume for the church, a "Ministry Information Form (MIF)."
- **14.** COM approves the MIF, and grants the PNC permission to send in out and to begin considering pastoral candidates.
- **15.** The PNC selects a candidate, who preaches for the congregation prior to election by the congregation.
- **16.** Newly called pastor begins work.
- **17.** Newly called pastor is installed by the Presbytery.

The PNC is dissolved and thanked.

In step 8 a lot has happened, so that the congregation can engage in a successful Mission Study. Step 9 is foundational for everything that follows. The effective work of the Pastor Nominating Committee hinges on the quality of the congregational mission study. Our mission study process will be contained in a congregation-wide event called "Memories, Hopes and Conversations", on Sunday, February 15. On page 7 of this Vision you can read a description of this event.

The session has been working hard, training and planning to prepare the congregation for new leadership and a new future. They have carefully considered how they might fully engage the congregation as a whole in that vital task. The session has chosen a proven strategy known as Appreciative Inquiry. They have tried it themselves, (with much enthusiasm and enlightenment), and they have appointed a competent team to lead the congregation through step 9.

We are excited and confident that the results of our congregational discernment on February 15 will provide a solid foundation for an effective pastoral search. For the sake of the future of our church, we encourage all of you to participate in "Memories, Hopes and Conversations" on February 15.

LONG RANGE DEV. TEAM UPDATE

The Long Range Development Team is alive and well. It has been some time since my last report in the Vision, because the LRDT has been waiting for the Developers to procure a tenant(s) for the new building. With today's economic conditions, no one is going to build a building on "spec" and then hope to fill it with tenants.

The Developers are working hard to find companies that will move into the building. They are talking with Real Estate Brokers, people from the U of A, Fletcher McCusker from Rio Nuevo, Michael Keith from Downtown Tucson Partnership and Steve Rosenberg from Biz Tucson to get the project out in the public.

They are also talking with representatives from CESL on possible leasing options. This would be wonderful as CESL is currently leasing space in the Ed Wing.

During this search the Developers continue to meet with representatives from WUNA and the City, so that when a tenant is found they can begin the process to construct the building.

The LRDT continues to meet and review any updates the Developers bring to us. Our next meeting is scheduled for January 2015.




FELIZ NAVIDAD!

- Approved the dates for Communion in 2015.

- Received a preview from Jerry about the upcoming December 6th Elder/Deacon Training from 9 to Noon.
- Learned that the records review on November 15th at Church of the Master in Mesa proved Trinity's records are in good and decent order.
- Praised the Nominating Committee for the completion of their work. Four congregants Liz Barlow, Bill Goodhue, Elliott Koeppen and Jean-

nette Ryan – have agreed to serve on the 2015 Nominating Committee. These persons will be elected at the January Annual Congregational Meeting.

- Approved having a Congregational Discernment Event on Sunday, February 15, 2015 as a part of worship with a revised schedule of classes, fellowship time and lunch. The committee planning this event will be promoting the event and informing the congregation. Watch for details!
